

Attention Veterans

If you served in Country in Vietnam, Korea in 68/69 (note the eligible units for compensation in this list) or Laos in 1968/69, you are more than likely eligible for compensation from the VA and possibly from Social Security!

Notice 3 New VA Approved cancers and sicknesses Effective October 13th, 2009 bringing the total of Agent Orange Dioxin Approved cancers and sicknesses to 69 These following cancers and sicknesses have just been added:
B cell Leukemia (Hairy Cell Leukemia)
Parkinson 's disease
Ischemic Heart Disease!!!

A new AO Related Cancer added as of July, 2009
This killer is called AL Amyloidosis #66

Also note the newly added cancers and sicknesses for the children of Female Vietnam Veterans!!!

Notice! All veterans regardless of when or where you served if you are suffering from ALS – “Lou Gehrig’s disease” you are all eligible for 100% Service Connected compensation.

If you are the Spouse of a Veteran deceased or sickened from any of these cancers or sicknesses listed you are very likely qualified for Veterans benefits.

Go to a Veterans Service Officer through most Veterans groups for help in filing the paperwork to aid you in applying for Veterans Survivor Benefits.

All of the diseases on the VA’s list of conditions linked to herbicide exposure appear in the left-hand column. If there is a requirement that the disease appear within a certain period of time, the time period appears in the right-hand column. Most time requirements are no longer enforced.

DISEASES OTHER THAN CANCER	TIME REQUIREMENT
<p>Peripheral Neuropathy (acute or sub acute) <i>Now also effective Diabetes II</i>, Only if you are normally a victim of Diabetes II first will you receive compensation...</p> <p><i>Always file your claim, but this rule will be enforced by the VA many times if you file for Peripheral Neuropathy without having Diabetes II first...</i></p> <p><u><i>Erectile Dysfunction Notice!</i></u> This is not paid for as a percentage on service connected disability, it is paid as service connected but as a Stipend and will not be shown on your Award Letter as a percentage. You have to apply for this separately to receive about \$90.00 to \$100.00 a month compensation above and beyond your rated disability. If you had any type of Service Connected illness such as Prostrate cancer, PTSD, and many other illnesses or cancers don't leave this money behind. Remember seldom will you be offered this money or told to apply for it, you have to apply for it as Erectile Dysfunction or it is sometimes called lack of a Creative Organ...</p> <p><i>Pancreatic Cancer</i> (if you have Diabetes II first it is then and only then will it be considered service connected.</p> <p>Newly added 07/15/2009 <i>AL Amyloidosis</i> <i>Chronic Lymphatic Leukemia</i> <i>ALS – Lou Gehig’s Disease and</i></p>	<p>No Time Limit!</p>

- Hydrocephalus due to aqueductal Stenosis**
